Overview

The 21st New York International Conference on Teaching Chinese, sponsored by the Chinese Language Teachers Association of Greater New York (CLTA-GNY) and China Institute will be held on Saturday, May 6, 2023 at China Institute in New York City, located at 40 Rector Street, New York, NY 10006.

This year's conference focuses on research, practices and innovations, and continues to provide a platform for teachers and scholars to have dialogues on advancing the teaching Chinese language and culture to speakers of other languages. The conference will be attended by language teachers, experts, and administrators from the U.S. and around the world.

Reading, Listening and Pronouncing—Exploring the Evolution of Standard Chinese Pronunciation from a Comparative and Historical Perspective

Speaker Bio:

Richard VanNess Simmons is Professor in the School of Chinese at the University of Hong Kong, where he is also Director of the Chinese Language Center, and Professor Emeritus at Rutgers University, where he served as Chair of the Department of Asian Languages and Cultures and as Director of the Confucius Institute. He holds an MA and Ph.D. in Sinology and Chinese dialectology from the University of Washington, Seattle, and has also studied and researched at National Taiwan University and the Institute of Linguistics at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences in Beijing. Awards in support of his scholarship include a multi-year grant from the Henry Luce Foundation U.S. China Cooperative Research Program to study the history of the dialects of Zhejiang and Jiangsu provinces in China. In Spring 2015 Simmons was the Starr Foundation East Asian Studies Endowment Fund Member of the School of Historical Studies at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, New Jersey. His areas of expertise include: Chinese dialectology, dialect geography, historical linguistics, history of Chinese, and Chinese sociolinguistics. His current research project is to compile a comprehensive history of Mandarin and Mandarin dialects.

Simmons' publications include Chinese Dialect Classification — A Comparative Approach to Harngjou, Old Jintarn, and Common Northern Wu (Amsterdam: John Benjamins, 1999; revision and translation in Chinese–Beijing: Zhonghua, 2010), Issues in Chinese Dialect Description and Classification (Journal of Chinese Linguistics Monograph Series, Number 15, 1999), Chinese Dialect Geography: Distinguishing Mandarin and Wu in Their Boundary Region (Shanghai: Shanghai Education, 2006), Handbook for Lexicon Based Dialect Fieldwork (Beijing: Zhonghua, 2006), Shanghainese Dictionary And Phrasebook (New York: Hippocrene, 2011), Studies in Chinese and Sino-Tibetan Linguistics: Dialect, Phonology, Transcription and Text (Taipei: Academia Sinica, 2014), Common Phonology of the Chinese Dialects (Singapore: Springer, 2020), and Studies in Colloquial Chinese and Its History—Dialect and Text.

Zhongbei (Daisy) Wu 吴中蓓 is an award-winning guzheng artist. A faculty member at the Performing Arts Division of Alfred University, Wu started one of the first credit-baring college guzheng courses in America and founded the Alfred University Guzheng Ensemble and has served as the Artistic Director for 12 years. With an impressive soloist career, Wu has performed in various venues including Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, China National Television, the United Nations Headquarters, the National Press Club in Washington D.C, and more. Wu studied with legendary guzheng virtuoso Wang Zhongshan and received her master's degree from the Graduate School of Chinese National Academy of Arts in Beijing. She was a music professor in China and had received two 'National Awards of Excellence in Music Education' consecutively in 2004 and 2005. A groundbreaking creator of contemporary compositions, Wu fuses guzheng's ancient eastern roots with western and modern music through her performances.

P.S. 310 The School for Future Leaders is a K-5 elementary school. It was established in September 2010 and is located in the Sunset Park district of Brooklyn, New York. This school serving immigrants and low-income families, under the leadership of founding principal Yuqing Hong, and the hard work of the entire school team, has been hailed as an outstanding high-performance school in New York City and New York State. In the 2017-2018, 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 school years, the school was listed as a Reward School in New York State because of its high academic achievement, and has been awarded the Lighthouse School Award by the "I Am A Leader" organization for several consecutive years. In 2021, it was awarded the title of National Blue Ribbon, becoming one of the model schools with high academic performance.

Jointly designed by China Institute and East China Normal University in Shanghai, China, the Teacher Certificate in Understanding of Chinese Culture & Practice is an innovative certificate program for K-16 teachers of Chinese as a second language to expand and advance a systemic understanding of the foundations of Chinese culture, making connections of traditions and contemporary applications, and support participants with skillsets and resources to engage with a school community that embraces diversity and cultural responsiveness.

The online program consists of monthly seminars taught in Chinese or English by renowned scholars on carefully selected topics. Planned topics include Chinese mythology, philosophy, religion, music, poetry, calligraphy, fine art, tea & trade, and architecture. Through accompanying pedagogical workshops guided by master teaching experts, participants will be able to bridge content understanding and practical skillsets, as well as school activities, while gaining resources to bring Chinese culture to your school community and classrooms.

Target participants include K-16 in-service and pre-service teachers of Chinese as a second language in foreign language, dual or immersion programs, as well as teachers of other subjects who are interested in selected topics.

Participants can choose sessions to enroll in monthly. According to the World-Readiness Standards for Learning Languages by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages, all language teaching must include 5 Cs (Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons and Communities). This seminar series will provide participants with subject matter content that meets the "Cultures" goal area of the World-Readiness Standards for Learning Languages. The goal is to bring to world language learners a global competence for their future careers and experiences.



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




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
